



Messiah in the Passover

A **Messiah in the Passover** program will provide your congregation with an opportunity to learn how Jesus feasted with His disciples at His Last **Passover** Supper and how he participated in this traditional Jewish Holy Day every year He lived on earth. Even as Jesus did this on that last evening with His disciples, He knew their Passover supper would illustrate His death for the sin of mankind to generations yet unborn.



Using the traditional elements of a Jewish Passover service, our speaker will explain Passover's history (Exodus 12), its meaning, how it was fulfilled through Jesus' death at Calvary, and why this Holy Day is still observed by Jewish people today.

Messiah in the Passover can be presented in a variety of ways:

A. A Demonstration.

This presentation is suitable for sermon time and takes about 45 minutes.

B. A Demonstration combined with a Communion Service.



This option allows the pastor/elder to include the communion service as part of the program, providing a vivid illustration

of the connection between Passover and communion. For this demonstration, allow about 45 minutes plus the time you need to serve your congregation the bread and cup.

C. A Demonstration with Congregational Participation.

Using this approach the congregation is seated at tables in your Fellowship Hall (or similar room) with a sample of all the elements of the Passover

service placed on each table. The members of the congregation partake of these elements as our missionary goes, step by step, through the Passover service. This program takes about 1 to 1½ hours.

D. A Banquet.

This presentation allows the congregation to take part in a traditional Jewish Seder (Service) by including a full meal with the demonstration. We provide instructions for preparing this meal. This program takes about 2 to 2½ hours.

By participating in any of the forms of this Bible-centred program, your witness to the Jewish community will be more effective and your congregation will be able to more closely identify with the Jewish roots of their faith.

Note: Although this presentation is appropriate throughout the year, it is most popular during the Easter and Passover seasons. Booking well in advance is recommended.
